Departmental Strengths

- We are proud of our continuum of services: 8:1:1, 6:1:1, 12:1:1, integrated co-taught, resource, consultant teacher, counseling, speech and language, occupational therapy, physical therapy, music therapy. In addition, we are able to provide supports for non-classified students including: ESL, counseling, Reading Recovery, and AIS for reading and math.
- We are able to educate Naples students with higher needs in their home district, rather than transporting them to BOCES. Progress for all of these students has been noted by: increased mainstreaming time; decreased time in Time Out or the Alternative Classroom Space; documented academic gains; and progress on IEP goals.
- We have successful working partnerships with general education teachers and collaboration within our department to support students. Having consistent therapists who are truly a part of the Naples culture assists with this.
- We have reorganized how we run department meetings in order to make them more efficient and productive. Department members have formed "micro-groups" to collaborate on small group projects and professional development this year.

Areas For Growth

- Staffing/Scheduling: With the addition of the 8:1:1 at the middle school level and moving Amanda Jennejohn to full time music, we actually have 1.5 fewer Special Education Teachers at the elementary level this year. Special Education services fluctuate based around student need so scheduling will always be a challenge. Below are some of the specific challenges this year.
 - AIS/RTI Times-We would like to work with the schedule so that Special Education Teachers are more available for RTI/AIS times next year. The Special Class students (4th, and 6th) are not receiving AIS instruction with their Special Education Teacher due to scheduling and staffing issues. 5th and 6th grade students with co-taught services are also unable to have RTI/AIS with their Special Education teacher.
 - We want to remind the BOE of the proposal from the Reading Team made last spring for a 1/2 time Reading, 1/2 time Special Assignment position.
- Least Restrictive Environment: We began a discussion with Karen on 12/21 about maintaining our continuum of services and working to ensure we provide all services in the Least Restrictive

Environment. Discussions will continue as we plan for next year. Some of our considerations include:

- Bringing integrated co-taught model back to primary grades.
- Investigating opportunities to support students currently in Special Class 12:1:1 in a more inclusive model.
- Investigating the possibility of providing resource room services in the general education setting as opposed to pulling students out of the classroom.
- Primary grade levels need more Leveled Literacy Intervention (LLI) kits, and accompanying benchmarking kits, we are sharing amongst general education, reading, and special education teachers currently.
- The Reading Department would like to have 2 teachers attend the Continuing Contact Professional Development that is required to maintain Reading Recovery Certification.
- In order to maintain high enough populations to support the continuation of the most Specialized Programs (8:1:1, 6:1:1), we may have to reach out to other districts.

STEAM Goal

- Creating a K-6 Math Strategies resource binder. The binder will contain strategy cards and posters that align with CCLS.
- Most Special Education and AIS Teachers are working alongside grade level teams on the curriculum mapping project for math and appreciate their inclusion. We appreciate the BOE's support in providing BOCES coach Jessica Sheridan to assist us.
- Moving from 30 to 40 minute RTI blocks has enabled AIS teachers to provide daily intervention in BOTH math and reading for students needing both services.
- Maintaining 4 AIS teachers to provide math and reading interventions has helped us to provide increased math support across grade levels, complete bi-monthly data collection, and allows for increased collaboration at data and CSE meetings.

21st Century Learners

- Work began this summer on an ipad integration document. This living document is organized around areas of need (i.e. decoding skills, organizational skills, vocabulary ,math etc.) and contains a list of apps and websites along with ideas for how to use the apps to support students.
- Anneke Radin-Snaith has helped to support AIS programs with ipads which is improving engagement and success in math and reading.
- The 21st century skills of teamwork, collaboration, and problem solving are embedded within all areas: therapies, resource room, integrated co-teaching and special classes. We are pleased to offer our students a variety of teaching models so they will succeed alongside their peers.

We want to thank the Naples Board of Education for their support of our department and programs such as Reading Recovery.

Department Celebrations:

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- 10th grade has a dedicated Special Education Teacher working with the grade level this year.
- Students in the new 8:1:1 program have transitioned well into the high school and are transitioning into more general education settings with support.
- More co-teaching opportunities in the areas of English and math.
 - All English 7-12 courses have at least 1 co-taught section.
 - Math 7-8 have co-taught sections.
 - Algebra has a co-taught section at the high school level.
- We've made some successful changes in individual student programming moving towards a less restrictive setting. This has required a great deal of teamwork and collaboration between special educators, general educators, guidance, parents, and students.
- Special Education FOCUS Review highlighted many positive attributes this fall:
 - Instructional practices, student engagement, and access to/use of technology with special education students are areas of strength.
 - The continuum of services offered in our small district was noted as a positive.
 - Collaboration between students, parents, general educators, and special educators was observed to be positive and allowed for participation of all members in the CSE process.
 - Most importantly, our CSE personnel were observed to have an overall strength in engagement and rapport with students--which are what matter most in our field!

Areas in Need of Growth / Improvement:

- As a department, we are always looking for meaningful, high-quality professional development. We would like to figure out a way to access more training relevant to our department.
- TCI for the general education setting. Perhaps the district could offer to all staff an abbreviated theory-based professional development in what TCI is founded on. This might benefit our students across all settings.
- We need to work to build up our transition services and connections with the outside work world.
 - Explore work program options for our area.
 - Educate students earlier on BOCES Vocational Technology Program offerings.

21st Century Skills:

Often 21st Century Skills are thought of as college and career readiness with an emphasis on college and resulting careers. However, the reality is that many of our students will not be pursuing this path, and, as a department, we focus on career/job skills that will support our students as successful, working adults with or without college. We have worked to compile a list of these skills. As you will note, many of these skills are "soft skills."

- Teaching coping skills and resources to assist with stress
- Encouraging kids to self-assess strengths, weaknesses, set goals
- Teaching study skills and working on executive functioning skills
- Providing opportunities and instruction for working with peers/groups
- Requiring use of technology on a daily basis in many areas
- Expecting students to master the same academic skills as grade-level peers
- Working on appropriate and effective communication and coping skills to allow them to communicate with professionals and handle roadblocks in an effective manner
- Providing guidance in reaching out for post secondary academic supports that fit their needs
- Gathering information on how and where to go for voter registration/Selective Service, college fairs, college visits, FLTCC programs, Finger Lakes Works Field Trip, etc.
- Having students complete resumes before leaving high school
- Providing instruction on how to locate a job online and create an account to fill out an application
- Practicing filling out job/school applications
- Providing practice in job interview skills with mock interviews
- Providing guidance in how to ask for a job reference or college recommendation letter

STEAM Readiness:

Our students have the opportunity to be exposed to a variety of learning experiences within these fields, whether it is in the advanced CAD courses Naples offers, or if it is simply exposure to, or enrollment in the BOCES votech programs. Though some of our students do not typically gravitate so much to the science, math, and engineering courses, many are interested in art and technology. It seems that some of our kids benefit from a hands on learning pedagogy. The electives Naples offers in art and technology cater to this learning style. The technology department (Ayers/Wilde) really do have some beneficial classes for our students that want a field such as carpentry (Architecture/Wood Manufacturing) and/or even Product Design and Engineering.

 - O Currently Abby Castle and I are collaborating with Kindergarten on a Needs versus Wants project.

Memorandum of Agreement

Athletic Director Assignment

Naples Teachers' Association

And

Naples Central School District

This Agreement is made by and between the Naples Teachers' Association (hereinafter referred to as the "Association") and the Naples Central School District (hereinafter referred to as the "District") as follows:

- A. WHEREAS, Article IX SPECIAL DUTY ASSIGNMENTS of the collective bargaining agreement dated July 1, 2014 June 30, 2018 between the District and the Association provides the Athletic Director duties and compensation; and
- B. WHEREAS, on or about October 8, during the 2015-2016 school year, the Association member in the position and performing the duties of the Athletic Director resigned; and
- C. WHEREAS, the District interviewed two (2) Association members and one (1) resident from the community; and
- D. WHEREAS, both Association members withdrew their names from consideration during the interview process; and
- E. WHEREAS, the District and the Association desire to clarify that this is an unusual situation and should be treated as such.

NOW THEREFORE, IN CONSIDERATION OF THE MUTUAL PROMISES SET FORTH BELOW, IT IS HEREBY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The District and the Association agree that under the circumstances the District may fill the Athletic Director vacancy with a non-bargaining unit member. The District and the Association further agree that when the position becomes vacant again that it shall be posted in accordance with their collective bargaining agreement.
- 2. This Agreement does not set a precedent or constitute a past practice. The District further agrees that it shall not use this Agreement or the hiring of the non-bargaining unit member for the position of Athletic Director under the terms of this Agreement as evidence of Association lack of exclusivity over the title or work in any matter whatsoever.
- 3. All provisions of the current collective bargaining agreement not modified by this Memorandum of Agreement shall remain in effect.

- 4. The Association and the District expressly warrant and represent that this Agreement represents the full, final and complete resolution to this matter.
- 5. Additionally, the Parties acknowledge that this Agreement shall not constitute or in any way be interpreted as a waiver of any and all rights the two parties have pursuant to the collective bargaining agreement.
- 6. This Agreement shall be effective upon execution of all parties.
