Health and Physical Education Department (2015-2016)

We support 21st century learners in the following ways:

Physical Education

- Students are introduced to a breadth of physical activities that improve fitness while reinforcing and incorporating core subject matter covered in the classroom.
- Students are challenged to think creatively, solve problems, communicate, be adaptable to change, and collaborate.
- We create an environment where all students are able to be unique, take risks, and value diversity.
- Throughout our curriculum students are taught to be health literate by taking accountability and responsibility for their lifestyle.

Family and Consumer Sciences:

- Collaboration with others while respecting classmates on diverse teams. We are constantly switching teams which allow students to work with a variety of students.
- Use technology as a research tool for our food labs, interior design, textile, career and finances and money units.
- Establish life skills such as flexibility while incorporating constructive criticism during our mock interviews.

Health Education:

- During multiple units, students understand preventative areas of wellness which encompasses all areas of health including mental, physical, emotional, mental, environmental, and social.
- Students monitor and reflect on self-goals and habits.

Our strengths and goals:

Physical Education

- Our curriculum and standards have long been aligned with 21st Century skills.
- New Plus 5 Fitness daily exercise program for students, Kindergarten through third grade.
- New lifeguarding course
- Curriculum is home grown and allows students to walk out their door and begin using our community resources for health and enjoyment.

Goals:

- 1. For our student learners to make a connection with an activity or a variety that will aid in their health related fitness for a lifetime.
- 2. Take students in grades 4th through 6th to Hunt Hollow in February.

Family and Consumer Sciences:

- Allow the learning and application of life skills in a realistic environment.
- Educate students with skills that they can apply into their adulthood such as budgeting, career research, design, sewing, cooking, problem solving, collaborating and decision making.

Naples Elementary School Board of Education Updates ~ February 2016

Collaboration with our BOCFS Coaches:

- All of our grade levels continue to meet with Jessica Sheridan (Math Coach) to work on their curriculum maps. It has been exciting to see the progress on these documents. Anneke Radin-Snaith created our template in the form of a google doc, so anyone on the team can add information/resources at any time. Jessica and I have planned a Professional Development session for one of our March faculty meetings that will focus on the development of quality/standards-based common assessments. This discussion will include how we document results from our common assessments, and how we will use this data to drive instructional decisions. Our math meetings will continue through June with grade levels meeting on average 1-2 times per month. Special Education Teachers have joined the grade levels that they work with.
- Social Studies Coaching with Melissa Kerrick has continued to focus on our curriculum document that integrates the new Social Studies Framework with all subject areas. Having Mrs. Infantino (Media Center), Mrs. Castle (Art/Tech) and Mrs. Austin/Miss Jennejohn (Music) be a part of this process has been invaluable in terms of resources, and integrating content into special area class instruction. Mrs. Kerrick has one more session with us, which will be a March faculty meeting. We will work with staff to determine which Social Studies inquiry to pilot first at each grade level.

Thursday, February 11^{th} was the 100^{th} Day of School. Students participated in lessons in their classrooms to celebrate the day, as well as the Media Center where students worked together to create masterpieces with 100 parts!





I wanted to say a huge thank you to Mrs. Watkins, one of our very special volunteers! Mrs. Watkins works with our 1st Grade Teachers to provide enrichment opportunities for our students. She is an extremely talented retired teacher who offers her time to support our school. Mrs. Watkins is here once a week in our Media Center or the conference room, working on special projects that support our curriculum and provide wonderful engaging activities for our students!

I would also like to thank to the Elementary Staff for their efforts in submitting their budgets in a timely manner for the Board's review. Departments spent a great deal of time prioritizing needs, and having thoughtful discussions regarding their requests. A special thank you to Amanda Jennejohn for her efforts to update our musical instrument inventory, prompting discussion around a better process for reviewing yearly requests.

There are a number of good things to report from the High School this month! I'm very pleased to say the transition from one semester to the next has gone very smoothly. Some of the highlights (some past, some future) include:

- 1. Gemini Field Trip-The Gemini English students (seniors) went on a field trip to GEVA theater in Rochester on Feb. 4th to see " A Miracle on South Division Street", a play about an ethnic family living in Buffalo who struggle with shifting cultural norms. It was a great performance and students thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to see "live theater"!
- 2. National Honor Society-As of today, there are 17 students eligible to complete the process for induction into the National Honor Society! There are a number of steps candidates must take before a final decision is made on selection, but we are hopeful all students identified as potential National Honor Society members will be inducted in April. It is a tremendous accomplishment for a student to reach such an impressive academic milestone and we are very proud of each and every one of them!
- 3. Kudos to a Substitute-At a recent Board meeting, Tyler Vest was approved as a substitute teacher. Although we are very sorry Liz Wolfe is out for a few weeks following surgery, I am pleased to report that Tyler has stepped in as Liz's long term substitute teacher and is doing a great job! He and Liz collaborate daily on instructional plans to be sure their students are getting a consistent program and will be right where they should be when we celebrate Liz's return. It's also great to see a Naples graduate come back so successfully as a teacher. My thanks to both Tyler and Liz for their commitment to their students.

- 4. "Little Shop of Horrors"-Rehearsals for the upcoming musical, "Little Shop of Horrors" are well underway and you can feel the enthusiasm build as opening night gets closer! We hope you will be able to attend one of the performances on Friday, March 18, Saturday, March 19, or a matinee on Sunday, March 20. It promises to be an engaging experience for both the performers and the audience alike.
- 5. Proposed Budget-I would like to thank the department chairs (and their colleagues) for their part in developing the budget proposals for 2016-2017. It was a very smooth process and I am grateful for their help. I am especially grateful to Mitch Ball who was a great teacher on all things budget. His patient explanations on the step by step process were invaluable in being able to submit the proposed budget on time.
- 6. Discipline Analysis-As part of his Administrative Internship, Nick Fargnoli has completed a very interesting analysis of discipline issues in the 7th-12th grades for the past two years. The analysis provides valuable information on grade level statistics, infraction location, gender, time of day, and other details we can use to identify ways to reduce discipline issues throughout the building. My thanks to Nick for his leadership on this project-his work will guide discussions and meaningful improvements for the entire school.
- 7. Building Maintenance-Having worked in several other schools around the region, I can say with confidence that Naples High School is the cleanest building I have seen. I marvel at how clean the halls are throughout the day and how responsible students are if they drop something-they actually pick it up! Congratulations to the custodial staff and our students for the pride and commitment they bring to the school. It shows-everyday!

Changes in New York State Alternate Assessment

The 2015-16 school year has brought dramatic changes for the New York State Alternate Assessment (NYSAA) system and process. NYSAA is the State assessment of students with significant cognitive disabilities and utilizes a pre- and post- assessment comparison to measure a student's academic growth after a period of instruction focused in very specific goal areas. Assessment of Naples students will begin next month.

The New York State Education Department (NYSED) has contracted this year with Dynamic Learning Maps (DLM) and the KITE Suite for the design and implementation of the alternate assessments administered to students at a third grade level, or age, and beyond. It is a computer-based, online assessment system requiring a high level of testing accommodations and modifications to the testing environment and technology. As of this year, NYSED will administer all English Language Arts and math alternate assessments. To do so, The Naples School District has identified Karen Mead, Director of Pupil Personnel Services, as the testing coordinator and Bernie Barnoski, BOCES Technology Support serving Naples Schools, as Technical Coordinator. It should be noted that NYSED has only contracted with DLM for the assessment products. The curriculum in which the assessments are based has not been adopted by the State.

Personnel and liaisons with BOCES have been working feverishly to support districts and staff with the changes and issues that have arisen to date. At this time, only one teacher in Naples Schools will be responsible to administer these tests. A full-day training is scheduled for that teacher on February 29th and Karen Mead will attend with the teacher to support the training and any needs that may arise for our district.
